THE CHRISTIAN SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM

SACRAMENT: "AN OUTWARD AND VISIBLE SIGN OF AN INWARD AND SPIRITUAL GRACE"

Sacraments ordained of Christ be not only badges or tokens of Christian men's profession, but rather they be certain sure witnesses, and effectual signs of grace, and God's good will towards us, by which he doth work invisibly in us, and doth not only quicken, but also strengthen and confirm our Faith in him. (#25 of the 39 Articles)

SACRAMENTS DON'T SAVE, FAITH DOES

And Jesus said to them, "Go into all the world and proclaim the good news to the whole creation. The one who believes and is baptized will be saved; but the one who does not believe will be condemned." - Mark 16:15-16

THE LORD'S COMMAND

Jesus said, "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit..." - Matthew 28:19

WATER AND WORDS

A SIGN THAT CARRIES A MESSAGE

THE MESSAGE

Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? Therefore we have been buried with him by baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in newness of life.... So you also must consider yourselves dead to sin and alive to God in Christ Jesus.

DON'T PIGEONHOLE WHAT CONVERSION LOOKS LIKE

ELEMENTS OF CONVERSION

1) CONFESSION OF NEED & SELF-HUMBLING

"God, be merciful to me, a sinner!" - Luke 18:13

Jesus said, "...for all who exalt themselves will be humbled, but all who humble themselves will be exalted." - Luke 18:14

- 2) TURNING TO JESUS HIMSELF & WELCOMING HIS REIGN
- 3) SEEKING TO BE OBEDIENT

GIFT OF BAPTISM = COMMUNION WITH GOD

Jesus said to him, "I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me." - John 14:6

BAPTIZED IN THE NAME OF THE TRINITY

WASHING

THE NEED FOR WASHING

Jesus said to Peter, "If I do not wash you, you are not in fellowship with me." - John 3:18

GOD DOES THE WASHING

CANCELING OUR GUILT BY FORGIVENESS

...the blood of Jesus his Son cleanses us from all sin.

BREAKING SIN'S DOMINION IN OUR LIVES

...how much more will the blood of Christ... purify our conscience from dead works to serve the living God.

A NEW SOCIETY

INVOLVEMENT IN BODY OF CHRIST NORMATIVE FOR BAPTIZED

ETHICS OF THE BODY

... for we are members of one another. - Ephesians 4:25

VALUE ONE ANOTHER

There is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus. - Galatians 3:28

SERVE ONE ANOTHER

But speaking the truth in love, we must grow up in every way into him who is the head, into Christ, from whom the whole body, joined and knitted together by every ligament with which it is equipped, as each part is working properly, promotes the body's growth in building itself up in love. - Ephesians 4:15-16

BAPTISM & INFANTS

CHRISTIAN DIVISION

SCRIPTURE NEITHER COMMANDS NOR FORBIDS INFANT BAPTISM

STRONG EVIDENCE APOSTLES PERFORMED INFANT BAPTISM

'At the same hour of the night (the jailer) took them and washed their wounds; then he and his entire family were baptized without delay. - Acts 16:33

INFANT BAPTISM & THE RELATION OF BAPTISM AND FAITH "Can infants have faith?"

YES & NO

NO: NOT FULL FAITH: INFANTS CANNOT ACKNOWLEDGE THE TRUTH OF GOSPEL & PROCLAIM JESUS AS LORD

YES: INFANTS CAN BELONG TO CHRIST & RELATE TO HIM THROUGH LIFE IN THE CHURCH

Jesus said, "Let the little children come to me, and do not stop them; for it is to such as these that the kingdom of heaven belongs." - Matthew 19:14

INFANT BAPTISM DEMANDS ADULT CONVERSION

OPPOSITION ROOTED IN OUTRAGE AT INDISCRIMINATE INFANT BAPTISMS

INDISCRIMINATE INFANT BAPTISM CAN BE A HINDRANCE TO SAVING FAITH

BAPTISM AND INFANT DEATH

FEAR OF INFANT DAMNATION CAN BE TRACED TO ST. AUGUSTINE

"...let no one promise for the case of unbaptized infants some middle place, as it were, between damnation and the kingdom of heaven, of rest and happiness... for this is what the heresy of Pelagius promsies them" -St Augustine

INFANT DAMNATION INCONSISTENT WITH SCRIPTURAL WITNESS

"Everyone therefore who acknowledges me before others, I also will acknowledge before my Father in heaven; but whoever denies me before others, I also will deny before my Father in heaven." - Matthew 10:32-33

WHEN THERE IS A REASONABLE EXPECTATION OF ACTIVE LIFE IN THE CHURCH


IT TAKES ACTIVELY BELIEVING PARENTS TO RAISE ACTIVELY BELIEVING CHILDREN

INFANT BAPTISM FROM A COVENANT THEOLOGY PERSPECTIVE


"Baptism isn't primarily a way for us to show our faith and devotion. As with worship more generally, God is the agent here. Baptism is a sacrament precisely because it is a means of grace, a way that God's gracious initiative marks and seals us. It is the sign that God is a covenant-keeping Lord who fulfills his promises even when we don't. This is why, since the time of the earl church, households have been baptized (Acts 16:33, 1cor 1:16), and it is why, historically in 'catholic' Christianity, believing parents present their children for baptism. Baptism is not a bottom-up expression of our faith but a top-down symbol of God's gracious promises. He chose us before we could believe; he loves before we even know how. Baptism signals our initiation into a people..."



1 Corinthians	Paul's 2nd of 4 letters to the Church at Corinth, Greece	-Division in the Corinthian church -sexual morality -food offered to idols -the Lord's Supper -spiritual gifts -resurrection
2 Corinthians	Paul's 4th of 4 letters to the Church at Corinth, Greece	-repairing Paul's relationship with Corinthian Church -request for financial aid for the Christians in Jerusalem -Paul on his apostleship
Galatians	Paul's letter to Galatian churches in Antioch, Iconium, Lystra, & Derbe	-Gentile Christians not required to be circumcised -law, faith, and salvation
Ephesians	Paul's circular letter to the churches around Ephesus	-unity of the Church -armor of God -living out new life in Christ
Philippians	Paul's letter from Roman prison to Church in Philippi, Macedonia	-Jesus as the model of humility -run to win the race -instructions on living

Turn control of my whole life over to the care of God and His direction, every day: including my relationships, my Practice #1:

God created us to receive our sense of value & identity and to hold him responsible for our needs, rather than Principle #2a:

from other people.

Look to God, rather than other people, for my sense of value and identity. Practice #2a:

Principle #2b: In Christ, I am a beloved child of God.

Receive and live in the truth that I am a beloved child of God, who wants to cares for my needs. Practice #2b:

God's intention is to transform me more and more into the likeness of Christ Principle #3:
